

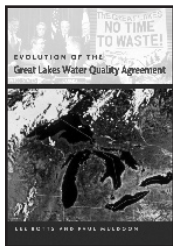
### Global Focus Images of a Land-Grant Tradition

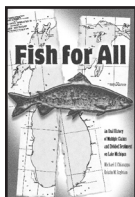

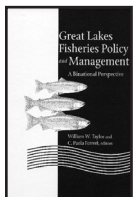


### Fish for All An Oral History of Multiple Claims and Divided Sentiment on Lake Michigan

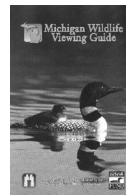

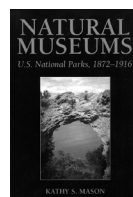
### The Muskegon The Majesty and Tragedy of Michigan's Rarest River

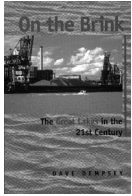


### Natural Museums U.S. National Parks, 1872-1916

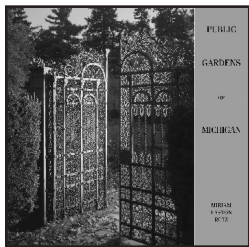


**On the Brink**

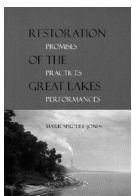

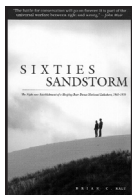

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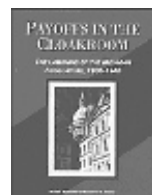

**Three Bullets Sealed His Lips**

The 1945 gangland-style slaying of State Senator Warren G. Hooper was three days before he was to testify before a grand jury investigating alleged corruption in the Michigan legislature. National media flocked to Michigan to follow the efforts of grand jury special prosecutor Kim Sigler and the State Police. No arrests ever were made. Utilizing interviews, trial transcripts, State police files, and a collection of grand jury testimony long thought to have been destroyed, Rubenstein and Ziewacz reveal the reason for Hooper's assassination.
