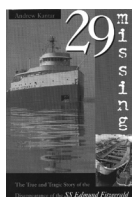


Grand Trunk Corporation *Canadian National Railways in the United States, 1971-1992*

Black November *The Carl D. Bradley Tragedy*

Michigan's "storms of November" are famous in song, lore, and legend, breaking the hulls of many ships and sending them to cold, dark, and silent graves on the bottoms of the Great Lakes. In November 1958, when the limestone carrier *Carl D. Bradley* broke up in a raging storm on Lake Michigan, it became the largest ship in Great Lakes' history to vanish beneath storm-tossed waves; 33 crew members perished. Most of the casualties hailed from the little harbor town of Rogers City, Michigan; in an instant, 23 women became widows and 53 children were left fatherless. Nevertheless, this is also a story of survival, and recounts the tale of two of the ship's crew, whose 15-hour ordeal on a life raft, in gale-force winds and 25 foot waves - a remarkable story of endurance and tenacity. 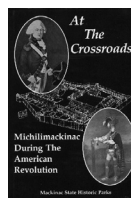
Shipping Literature of the Great Lakes *A Catalog of Company Publications, 1852-1990*

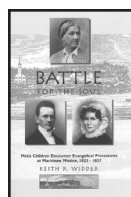


At the Crossroads *Michilimackinac During the American Revolution*

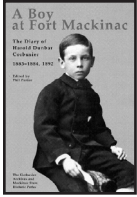

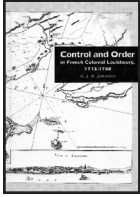

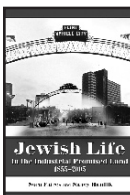


Jacques Legardeur de Saint-Pierre Officer, Gentleman, Entrepreneur

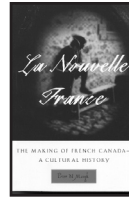

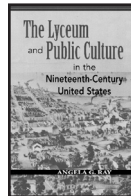

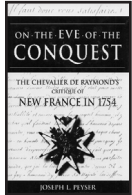


The Northwest Ordinance

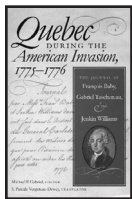

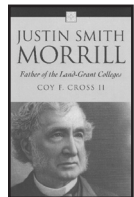
**The West to Far Michigan

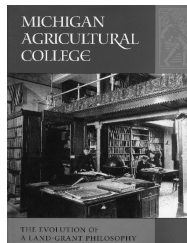


**Justin Smith Morrill

Vintage photographs profusely illustrate this saga of America's premier land-grant institution, long before it became Michigan State University. Forward-looking legislators, scholars, and administrators found an oak clearing in the midst of central Michigan swampland and there laid the groundwork for what would become one of the world's great universities. From the school's founding in 1855, and for the next 70 years that are discussed in this volume, the institution struggled to find itself and, in the process, helped to invent the notion of what it means to be a university "for the people," a land-grant university.
